

Continuing Education High School Program Summer 2009 Session

Parent/Student Informational Session

All parents and students registered for the 2009 High School Credit Summer School program are encouraged to attend an evening orientation meeting. This short, informative meeting will be held at College of DuPage in the K Building West Commons on Tuesday, June 9, 2009, from 6 to 7 p.m. and will repeat from 7:30 to 8:30 p.m. Topics will include:

- **Policies**
- **Grading Options**
- **Required Forms**

Textbooks

Textbooks, when needed, are included in the price of each class with the exception of courses held at West Chicago High School. West Chicago High School will loan books free of charge for programs held at that location.

Students may pick up their text at any time between the hours of 7:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., Monday through Friday at the Continuing Education Office in Glen Ellyn, Building K, Room 165. The hours will be extended for textbook pick up during the Parent/Student Orientation, Tuesday, June 9, from 5:30 to 8:30 p.m. and on Sunday, June 14 from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. in the Continuing Education Office (K 165). Textbooks must be returned in good condition at the end of the term to the classroom instructor. If the textbook is not returned or is considered unusable, neither the student nor the high school will receive the grade report for the course until the full replacement cost for the book is paid. Students enrolled at West Chicago High School are provided textbooks from the school; you do not need to pick up a book in advance.

Required Forms

All parents and students must read and sign the forms listed below. (Samples of the forms are found at the end of this booklet.) Copies of the forms are sent home for appropriate signatures on the first day of class (both semesters) and must be returned by the second day of class. Failure to return these forms results in the student remaining in class but being marked tardy for each day the forms are not returned. Two tardies equals one absence (see Attendance Policy.) Forms distributed by teachers during the first class are as follows:

- **Student Code of Conduct**
- **Appropriate Use of Computer/Online Resources Contract**
- **High School Attendance/Tardies/Final Exam Policy**
- **Emergency Contact Information**
- **Lab Safety Contract (Science students only)**

A parent/guardian signature on each of the forms constitutes an understanding and acceptance of policies/conditions set forth by the College of DuPage Continuing Education department.

Absences/Tardies/ Final Exam

College of DuPage offers a two-semester High School Summer School program. Classes are four hours per day for 16 days, Monday through Friday. These programs are open to students entering or currently enrolled in high school. Summer school is an extension of the regular academic program designed to provide students with opportunities to gain academic credit or to explore interests by auditing a class. It is an excellent occasion for incoming freshmen to become more familiar with high school expectations.

One day in the summer program equals one week of a regular school year. Prompt and consistent attendance is mandatory to ensure the same contact hours, teaching and learning opportunities as during the school year. Students should not register for classes for high school credit if they have vacation plans, athletic camps/competitions, or other obligations that prevent them from attending class.

Absences

Summer school is a condensed school experience. Classes meet Monday to Friday for four hours per day for 16 days, and student are expected to be present. However, illness and emergencies do occur. Students are allowed two (2) absences per semester course. More than two absences per course will result in a "Withdraw" grade being issued for no credit, without refund. Calling in a student absence does not excuse the absence.

Tardies

Two (2) tardies either at the beginning of the day or the break, per semester course equals one (1) absence. Tardies exceeding 15 minutes equal an absence.

Any combination of absences and tardies that exceed two (2) "days" results in a "Withdraw" grade being issued for no credit, without refund. Every effort is made to notify the parent/guardian of absences or tardies. Parents are asked NOT to register their child for summer high school classes when they anticipate a conflict with their personal schedule. No special arrangements will be made after the allowed two (2) days of absence for any reason.

Final Exams

If a student is enrolled in a class that requires a final exam, the final is given on the last day of class in the semester only. If a student is absent for the final exam, C.O.D. cannot and will not provide an opportunity for any "make-up exam," nor will C.O.D. administer the final exam early or proctor the exam at a later time. The grade the student receives for the final exam in these cases is recorded as an "F" (zero points) and is factored into the semester grade.

Parent/Guardian signature on the High School Attendance Policy form constitutes understanding and acceptance of these conditions.

Progress Reports

Student progress reports are issued twice during each 16-day semester. Each report includes student attendance and punctuality as well as the current grade. Reports are given to students on the fifth day and 10th day of class. Please request these from your child.

Should a parent need to contact an instructor for any reason, all instructors provide a telephone number and/or e-mail address on his/her syllabus. Instructors cannot be reached during class hours or interrupted during instruction time.

Grading Scale/Options

Upon completion of a summer school course, grades will be sent to the home address. If the student wishes to inform his/her high school of the grade, a Release of Grade form must be completed and signed before the grade is forwarded. The letter grades are A, B, C, D, F, or W (withdrawal).

Letter Grade

A = 90 to 100 percent

B = 80 to 89 percent

C = 70 to 79 percent

D = 60 to 69 percent

F = 59 percent and below

P/F (Pass/Fail) is for the Illinois and U.S. Constitution Tests only

Audit Grade

No credit is awarded for this course. Students who are looking for enrichment only would benefit from auditing a course. An "X" is recorded on the grade report and will only be sent home. The grade is not factored into your GPA. Tests and quizzes are not mandatory and grades are not recorded. Attendance is not recorded and students must adhere to all summer school policies and procedures. Audit grades are NOT reported to high school and audits are IRREVOCABLE.

Withdrawal

"W" is received from the instructor when the student has more than two absences (Two tardies = one absence) per semester course or for any violation listed in the High School Attendance Policy or the Student Code of Conduct-Appropriate Use of Computer/On-line Resources Contract. If a student voluntarily withdraws from a course, he/she should contact the Continuing Education office to officially drop the course to ensure that no grade report is generated.

Submitting Grades

Grade reports will be sent to the high school when you have completed and signed the Release of Grade form provided to your student at the start of the term. This form may be turned in any time during the course or following the completion of the class. For your information, Continuing Education keeps all grades on file for six (6) years.

Grades submitted from the College of DuPage Summer High School Credit program to the local high schools are FINAL. This policy is designed to maintain the grade/transcript as an accurate

and complete record of attendance and meeting course requirements.

Tuition and Refund Policy

General courses are priced at \$329 per semester which includes textbooks.

Science courses include lab fees and textbooks:

- Physical Science - \$339
- Biology - \$349
- Chemistry - \$349
- Physics - \$339

Art classes also include lab fees, though no textbook is required:

- Art I - \$294
- Computer Graphics - \$294
- Photo - \$294 (plus film and photography paper)

A full refund will be granted if a student withdraws from first-semester classes by Friday, June 12, and/or from second-semester classes by Wednesday, July 8 for classes at the Glen Ellyn campus, Neuqua Valley, Waubonsie, or West Chicago High School.

Full refunds will be granted for Glenbard North, South, East, or West students, if the student withdraws from first-semester classes by Friday, June 26 and/or second-semester classes by Tuesday, July 21.

No Refunds will be issued for the following reasons:

- If student registers for class and does not attend
- If student withdraws after the above-mentioned withdrawal dates for ANY reason
- If student is dropped for violation of the Student Code of Conduct-Appropriate Use of Computer/ Internet and/or the High School Attendance Policy

Please call (630) 942-2208 by the end of the first class day if your child is attending the wrong class or is attending at the wrong location.

How to Register

Students may register by mail, fax (630) 942-3785, or phone (630) 942-2208 beginning on **February 2, 2009**.

Parents/Students need to use the registration form in the back of this brochure to register for classes when mailing or faxing. Complete all the information requested on the form; **it is imperative to include the name of the high school where grades are to be sent.**

Special Needs Students

Students with disabilities need to identify themselves as early as possible by phoning (630) 942-2412. The college provides reasonable accommodations to special needs students. The most common services provided to students with disabilities include: note-taking paper, enlarged print, testing accommodations, mobility assistance, preferential seating, books on audio tape, barrier free parking, and TTY. CREDIT COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

Homework is assigned and grades are given. Check with your guidance counselor for credit eligibility

MATHEMATICS

Pre-Algebra, Sem 1 & 2

This course introduces the basics of Algebra with practice in basic mathematical skills and provide a smooth transition from arithmetic to algebra concepts and basic geometry. Importance is placed on reinforcing reading and study skills in addition to encourage critical thinking and problem solving skills to succeed in algebra. Student needs to bring scientific calculator to class.

Algebra I, Sem 1 & 2

This course is equivalent to high school Algebra I and promotes the sequential study of variables and variable expressions encompassing operations of real numbers, systems of equations and inequalities, graphs of linear relations, rules of exponents, work with quadratic functions and equations, operations with polynomials, including factoring techniques, operations with rational expressions, and radical expressions and equations. The course is designed to strengthen students' skills and attitudes towards quantitative reasoning.

Algebra II with Trig, Sem 1 & 2

This course is the equivalent of high school Algebra II w/Trig and reviews and extends the main concepts of algebra by examining linear equations and inequalities, systems of linear equations, quadratic functions and complex numbers, polynomial functions, rational exponents, exponential and logarithmic functions, arithmetic and geometric sequences and series, combinations, permutations and probability, right triangle trigonometry, graphing trigonometric functions and solving trigonometric equations. Prerequisite: Algebra I.

Intergrated Algebra-Geometry 1, Sem 1 & 2

This course takes a problem solving approach to learning numeric, algebraic and statistical concepts. Students spend approximately 30% of class time working with computer software that provides individual instruction and

feedback. The first semester course takes the place of 9th grade Algebra and the second semester course takes the place of 10th grade Geometry. These classes are appropriate and should be taken by students who failed one or more semesters for this course during the regular school year so they may move on to the next level of mathematics instruction. Open to Glenbard district 87 students ONLY.

Intergrated Algebra-Geometry 2, Sem 1 & 2

This course takes a problem solving approach to learning numeric, algebraic and statistical concepts. Students spend approximately 30% of class time working with computer software that provides individual instruction and feedback. The first semester course takes the place of 9th grade Algebra and the second semester course takes the place of 10th grade Geometry. These classes are appropriate and should be taken by students who failed one or more semesters for this course during the regular school year so they may move on to the next level of mathematics instruction. Open to Glenbard district 87 students ONLY.

Geometry Fundamentals, Sem 1 & 2

This course is designed for students who wish to increase their confidence in the study of algebra and geometry. Each topic is sequentially designed to build on prior knowledge and explore new concepts through patterns and reasoning. Students seeking a strong review of geometry skills prior to taking the next level of algebra are encouraged to enroll in this class. Open to Glenbard district 87 students ONLY.

Geometry, Sem 1 & 2

This course is equivalent to one year of high school geometry and promotes the sequential study of coordinate geometry, measurement, inductive and deductive reasoning, parallel line relationships, congruent triangles, quadrilaterals, proportions related to similarity, right triangle relationships, circles and their related angles and segments, area formula for planar figures, surface area and volume formulas for solids, and equations and graphs of lines. The course is designed to strengthen students' skills and attitudes towards quantitative reasoning. Prerequisite: Algebra I.

ICA, Sem 1 & 2

(Intermediate College Algebra)
This course is equivalent to one year of high school Intermediate College Algebra and reviews and extends the main concepts of algebra by examining linear equations and inequalities, systems of linear equations, quadratic functions and complex numbers, polynomial functions, rational exponents, exponential and logarithmic functions, arithmetic and geometric sequences and series, combinations, permutations and probability, right triangle trigonometry, graphing trigonometric functions and solving trigonometric equations. Prerequisite: Algebra I and Geometry. Prepares student for Pre-calculus, Calculus, Trigonometry.

Pre-Calculus, Sem 1 & 2

This course is equivalent to one year of high school Pre-calculus and reviews and extends the main concepts of advanced algebra by examining functions, equations and inequalities that include linear, quadratic, polynomial, exponential, logarithmic, rational, and radical, as well as sequences and series. The course is designed to strengthen students' skills and attitudes towards quantitative reasoning. Prerequisite: Geometry and Algebra II.

LANGUAGE ARTS

English 9, Sem 1 & 2

Two semesters of English 9 are equivalent to one year of high school freshman English and covers fundamental skills in composition, grammar and usage. Emphasis is given to reading, writing, thesis-development and continuity, literary types, vocabulary and study skills.

English 10, Sem 1 & 2

Two semesters of English 10 are equivalent to one year of high school sophomore English and emphasize the study of literature, writing, grammar, vocabulary, study skills and complex tasks and expands on the skills introduced at the freshman level.

American Literature, Sem 1 & 2

Two semesters of American Literature are equivalent to one year of high school American Literature and emphasize the study of American literature, literary history, language and

composition. *Please note that this is considered a junior level course in most local school districts but offered to sophomores in District 204.*

British Literature

This course explores literary trends of the late 19th and 20th century British writers. Poetry, essays, novels, short stories and plays of this period are included. Classic works are read, discussed and analyzed within the context of the eras they represent.

Senior Composition

This one semester course is designed for college-bound seniors offering practice in writing various types of exposition required in college. Learn ways to organize your thoughts, review and select material, arrange writing into a strategic form, develop an effective writing style, use correct and interesting vocabulary, and produce a college application essay.

Speech

This equivalent of one semester of high school Speech is designed to help students develop an understanding of basic concepts in the process of oral communication; including communication theory, speech preparation and delivery.

Creative Writing

This course is designed to give students an opportunity to express themselves through writing short stories, poetry, research, performances and other creative pieces. Students will examine the works of established writers as well as critique their own writing and that of classmates. There will be occasional time in the computer lab for revision and research. Precision in word choice, variety in sentence structure, clarity and originality will be emphasized.

Film as Literature

In this one semester elective course, students will study film as a form of literature. Students will study films from historical, thematic, genre, and artistic approaches viewing approximately 15-20 films, which have been selected based on the value as art as well as their impact on the film audience. Students will also study and put into practice the styles and techniques of making motion pictures. While there is emphasis on viewing, listening and group discussions,

students will also develop notable English based skills. Reading skills will be addressed through assignments in two texts and multiple hand-outs. Writing skills will be addressed through a strong expository writing component in the curriculum. The primary objective of the course is to provide students with an opportunity to become cinema literate. (Some material studied in this course may be mature in subject matter.) The film list will be available to students on the first day of class.

Contemporary Literature and Composition

This one semester course offers a study of the connection of modern written works to your life experiences. Novels, short stories and non-fiction will be read. *District 204 students must complete the Registration Approval Form and be recommended by their high school guidance chair.*

FOREIGN LANGUAGE

French I, Sem 1 & 2

This course is the equivalent of one year of high school French I. Basic vocabulary, verb tenses, and sentence structure will be introduced in oral and written form.

French II, Sem 1 & 2

This course is the equivalent of one year of high school French II and builds on the skills learned in French I. Students integrate new vocabulary, verb tenses and sentence structure in both oral and written form. Prerequisite: French I.

Spanish I, Sem 1 & 2

This course is the equivalent of one year of high school Spanish I. It serves as an introduction to the sound system, pronunciation, basic vocabulary, verb structure and other grammatical concepts of the language.

Spanish II, Sem 1 & 2

This course is the equivalent of one year of high school Spanish II. It builds and expands on the concepts covered in Spanish I while introducing more advanced structures and vocabulary. Listening comprehension, speaking, reading and writing skills are practiced through small group and teacher-directed activities.

SCIENCES

Physical Science, Sem 1 & 2

This course is equivalent to one year of high school Introduction to Physical Science. IPS will include topics involving Earth and Space Science, presenting attitudes and skills using scientific methods of problem-solving in a lab setting. This course provides preparation for Chemistry, Physics and other upper-level science courses. Prerequisite: Pre-Algebra.

Biology, Sem 1 & 2

This course is the equivalent of one year of high school Biology. A basic survey of the biological sciences, this course employs an inquiry approach to study living organisms and their basic structures. Topics include chemistry, cells, ethics, classification, plants, ecology, study of animal body systems culminating in a dissection, evidences of evolution, structure and function of DNA, protein synthesis, Mendellian and applied genetics, and current trends in biology.

Chemistry, Sem 1 & 2

This course is the equivalent of one year of high school Chemistry, covering fundamental lab skills through the periodic table and kinetic molecular theory through an understanding of acid-base reactions. It focuses on understanding the different forms of matter that comprise our physical world and the many changes these forms of matter undergo in our universe.

Physics, Sem 1 & 2

This course is equivalent to one year of high school Physics. This course is designed to give the student an overview of various areas of the physical universe. Laboratory experiences permit inquiry into the nature of physical science and to inquire into the nature of physical law, a process that is transferable to any discipline. Some problem solving is included.

SOCIAL STUDIES

American Government

This equivalent of one semester of high school American Government provides students with a critical perspective on government and politics in American life. Attention is given to the political

system, how it works and the rights and responsibilities of citizens. The US & IL Constitution tests will be administered during this course. This class is for seniors only at the West Chicago High School site.

Global Studies, Sem 1 & 2

Global Studies integrates the most important elements of World History and World Geography. It provides students with an understanding of key people and historical events and how geography shaped those events. Open to Glenbard district 87 students ONLY.

U.S. History, Sem 1 & 2

This course is equivalent to one year of high school U.S. History. Attention is given to Colonial America, the American Revolution, the rise of American political thought, Federalist and Republic eras, westward expansion, manifest destiny, slavery, Civil War, Reconstruction, Progressive movement, economics, Post War, Cold War, Civil Rights, Vietnam, Watergate and recent administrations. **The U.S. and Illinois Constitution exams are given during the 1st semester of the class.**

World Geography, Sem 1 & 2

This equivalent of one year of high school World Geography explores the peoples of earth and their global environment. The interaction of land, climate and natural resources with world cultures is studied. Major world regions include countries in the Western Hemisphere, Europe, Russia, Northern Africa and the Middle East.

World History, Sem 1 & 2

This course is the equivalent of one year of World History taught in high school. Topics covered include the politics, arts, society, skills, economics, and religions from ancient Egypt to the Renaissance.

Psychology

This course is the equivalent of one semester of high school psychology, providing students with an overview of the sub-fields of psychology as well as an understanding of their own behavior and the behavior of other individuals in society. This is a college-prep course that requires challenging reading.

BUSINESS AND CONSUMER EDUCATION

Consumer Education

This equivalent of one semester of high school consumer education promotes the study of financial principles and consumer practices on which individual and family welfare depend. Topics include: career planning, budgeting, taxes, insurance, housing, investments, buying techniques, product evaluation and consumer resources.

Economics

This course is the equivalent to one semester of high school Economics. It is a study of the American economic system and its role in the global economy. Topics include money, taxes, investment, supply and demand, labor issues, international trade and global economic systems.

Keyboarding

This equivalent of the one semester of high school computer typing is designed to help students develop keyboarding skills. Students are instructed in basic skills, vocabulary, and concepts necessary for accurate production of papers and reports using Microsoft Word. This course combines lecture and lab time; grades are based on typing performance and written assignments.

Computer Applications

This course is designed to assist students with computer skills needed for success in high school and beyond. Proficiency in Microsoft Office programs such as Word, PowerPoint, Excel, Access and Publisher to building simple web pages (for a more in-depth web building course, see Web Design description). Keyboard speed and technique are developed through drills and additional assignments. Prerequisite: Keyboarding.

ELECTIVES

Art I

This course is a recommended entry-level course for all students who have an interest in art and is equivalent to a one-semester high school art course. The main emphasis will be on the Elements of Art and the Principles of Design. Students have the opportunity to explore a wide variety of media as

well as some craft areas, basic drawing technique and both 2-D and 3-D design.

Photo I

This course is equivalent to one semester of a high school photography class. Students develop a fundamental knowledge of the basic processes of black and white photography through the processing, printing, finishing and display of their own film. Students must have an adjustable 35mm camera and are responsible for purchasing their own film and photographic paper.

Theatre Arts

This one-semester course explores the joy and excitement of theater. Focus is on the theory of acting, the process of directing and the elements of technical theater. Students can perform in areas including pantomime, improvisation and acting.

Computer Graphics

This one-semester course is a combination of 2D and 3D graphics. Adobe Photoshop will be used for 2D image editing, compositing and painting. The 3D component might use Poser, Bryce3D and Wings3D to create figures, landscapes and objects which can be combined and used to create animations (this depends on the location of the class). Prerequisite: Intro to Art recommended, but not required

Web Design

This one-semester course explores the basic techniques used to create web pages. Learn to format text, create hypertext links and incorporate graphics into your pages. Prerequisite: Keyboarding

PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND HEALTH

Health

This course is the equivalent of one semester of high school health, covering mental health, human sexuality, nutrition, disease, drugs, safety and first aid.

Physical Education

This course is the equivalent of one semester of high school Physical Education. Activities include conditioning and fitness, aerobics, weight training, individual and team sports. Some locations have specific

activities; instructor syllabus will outline activities.

ENRICHMENT/ NON-CREDIT COURSES

All courses are offered on the Glen Ellyn campus unless otherwise noted.
